

Guidelines for e-Journals access

E-resources are subject to copyright law just like printed materials and their use is also governed by the license agreements that Institute for Plasma Research (IPR) signs with publishers when arranging electronic access. These agreements set out how the e-resources may be used and who may use them. You are responsible for ensuring that you use e-resources in accordance with these requirements.

From the time Publishers makes available on its website an online edition of a Journal, the Institution may access, during the period for which the subscription has been paid, the database of Journal material during that period, including tables of contents, abstracts, and full texts of issues published during the subscription period.

Institutional subscribers and publishers agree to the following terms and conditions:

AUTHENTICATION/ABUSE:

- Access is permitted from the Internet domain (IP addresses) of the Institution as specified on the registration form.
- Access is permitted solely to Authorized Users.
- If Institutional subscribers become aware of unauthorized access to Journals, they will notify publishers immediately and cooperate in locating and attempting to stop the specific individuals who are abusing the service.

USAGE POLICY

IPR is responsible for undertaking reasonable measures to prevent access by unauthorized persons to its authorized IP addresses, and is responsible for terminating any unauthorized access of which it has actual notice or knowledge.
